Talent Game



Family Connection

OVERVIEW: Being wise is different than being smart. A smart person knows a lot of facts, but a wise person is able to apply those facts to the situation at hand. Instead of just telling children what to do, help them think through their decisions by asking, "What would be the wise thing to do?" You can break it down even further by asking, "Is that being responsible?" or "Is that being respectful?" or "Is that really true?" This kind of thinking leads to better decisions.
